# **A Varying Relationship**

The Bible, which is mainly about this relationship, teems with illustrations of our diverse responses to him, and him to us. Here are some examples, do you identify with any of them?

### **Hiding**

Genesis 3:8-10 pictures God walking in the garden in the cool of evening saying, "Where are you?" Adam and Eve, naked and afraid uselessly hide from him. Years later the psalmist feels that God himself is hiding., "Why, O Lord, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble?" Psalm 10:1






# Longing

   Deuteronomy 33:12


And Jesus's words to his tired disciples, who didn't even have a chance to eat because of the coming and going.

# **Persisting**

When Peter refused to let Jesus serve him by washing his feet, Jesus persisted; he said, "Unless I wash you, you have no part with me." John 13:8



He encourages us to persist in coming to God, telling the parable of the widow who persisted with the unjust judge, to teach us not to give up. And he responded gladly to those who persisted and overcame obstacles in order to reach him: The woman with bleeding, pushing her way through the crowd; blind Bartimaeus, shouting until Jesus responded; and Zacchaeus climbing a tree. Here is the account of Zacchaeus:







<u>1</u>Then Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. <u>2</u>And there was a man named Zacchaeus, a chief tax collector, who was very wealthy. <u>3</u>He was trying to see who Jesus was, but could not see over the crowd because he was small in stature. <u>4</u>So he ran on ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see Him, since Jesus was about to pass that way.

5When Jesus came to that place, He looked up and said, "Zacchaeus, hurry down, for I must stay at your house today."

**6**So Zacchaeus hurried down and welcomed Him joyfully. **7**And all who saw this began to grumble, saying, "He has gone to be the guest of a sinful man!"

**8**But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, "Look, Lord, half of my possessions I give to the poor, and if I have cheated anyone, I will repay it fourfold."



<u>9</u>Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man too is a son of Abraham. <u>10</u>For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost."

Luke 1:1-10

Zacchaeus was small, unpopular, a known cheat. No one in the crowd was going to help him, but he persisted and found a way. When Jesus saw the lengths he'd gone to, he decided to spend the day with him - a man after his own heart. How these two men must have enjoyed that day.

It's the same for us. Jesus wants to connect with us; if we want to be closer, he will respond.

#### Here are some questions to consider:

- How would you draw a picture of your present relationship with God?
- Has it changed in the present circumstances?
- How do you feel God feels towards you?
- How do you feel towards him?
- Do you want that picture to be different? If so, in what way?

If we want things to be different, we may need to persist through difficulties, but we can ask and keep on asking, trusting that he'll answer.

We once had a puppy. We planned not to feed her at table. She was very good. She didn't jump up or whimper, but just sat there, shuffling her little bottom to get as close to us as possible, and gazing up unwaveringly with those hopeful, moist, brown eyes. Guess who won?
